Experience

At Howard Community Academy, we believe that learning should go beyond the classroom. Educational trips offer a fantastic opportunity for our students to connect with history, nature, and science in ways that enrich our learning. This term, two unforgettable school trips allowed our students to immerse themselves in different worlds: a WW2 Evacuee Experience Day at Milden Hall for Otter class and an educational adventure at the Museum of Zoology in Cambridge for Badger class.

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Otter class trip took us to Milden Hall, where our Year 4 and 5 pupils experienced life as WW2 evacuees.

Stepping back into the 1940s, the children learned what it was like to leave their families behind and travel to the countryside to escape the dangers of bombings. Upon arrival, the students were greeted by friendly guides dressed in period costume, who introduced them to wartime life. Taking on the role of evacuees, the students were given tasks such as collecting the eggs and experiencing what life on a farm may have been like.

The group then participated in various hands-on activities. Throughout the day, they had the chance to

wear clothes from the era, and explored vintage artefacts. One of the highlights was the opportunity to experience ringing an air raid siren, where students learned about the importance of "safety drills" during wartime. The teachers were impressed by the enthusiasm and engagement of the students, who asked thoughtful questions and gained a deeper understanding of the sacrifices made by children their age during the war.

This trip was a truly immersive learning experience, bringing history to life and allowing students to gain a better understanding of the realities faced by wartime evacuees. The day helped to reinforce our WW2 curriculum in a memorable and meaningful way.

Trip to the Fitzwilliam Museum

In November, our students from Badger class embarked on a fascinating trip to the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge. As part of their learning about the Ancient

Greeks, the students had the chance to

explore one of the most renowned

museums in the country.


During their visit, the students were guided through a selection of exhibits that showcased everything from ancient Greek sculptures to Renaissance paintings. They explored

A message from Jonathan Culpin, CEO Anglian Learning

As CEO of Anglian Learning, the multi-academy Trust which supports your child/ren's school, I would like to share some key highlights of the work Anglian Learning has undertaken in the last few months. These activities have benefited our pupils, workforce and communities of our Trust.

As a large school trust, we received £1.8 million in government funding to enhance the condition of our schools. While this does not meet all our needs, it has allowed us to prioritise health and safety improvements, essential repairs and the energy efficiency of our buildings. A major piece of work was the installation of solar panels across all our schools, reducing energy costs and our carbon footprint. The money saved can be allocated to other areas for the education of our young people.

Other important areas we have focused on include:

- Strengthening our IT infrastructure to protect against cyber attacks
- Reviewing safeguarding in all schools
- Introducing a Teaching and Learning
 Framework that sets out the principles of excellent classroom teaching to be adopted by each school
- Hosting leadership conferences for headteachers and deputy headteachers on creating strong teams, supporting positive relationships with pupils and much more
- Starting our 'Belonging by Design' strategy to improve pupil attendance, SEND support and mental health, supported by the funding we have received from Cambridgeshire and Suffolk Local Authorities.

Finally, in November, we celebrated our secondary school pupils' creativity with the Platform 24 art exhibition at The Michaelhouse Café. The exhibition featured inspiring work from our talented KS3, KS4 pupils and A Level students.

I wish all families a restful break and thank you for your continued support as we work to transform education together.

Nurturing

Art projects have been continuing to help to develop our pupils' selfesteem, confidence, and critical thinking

At our school, we have been thrilled to see how arts projects have been continuing to help to develop our pupils' self-esteem, confidence, and critical thinking. By exploring dance and creative arts, students are not only learning new skills but also gaining a deeper understanding of themselves and how to express their ideas in innovative ways.

One exciting collaboration was through an arts residency project, organised by the Norwich and Norfolk Festival with Glasshouse Dance Company, who worked with our Year 4 pupils on a project focused on themes of confidence and spatial awareness through dance. Over several sessions, pupils explored how they could express emotions and ideas through movement, developing their confidence as they worked together. Highlights of the project were opportunities for our pupils to dance across our school site, using different spaces creatively. This experience helped students overcome self-doubt, encouraged them to take creative risks, and boosted their self-esteem, all while learning about the power of physical expression.

Another fantastic arts project involved Arting Around, who worked with a group of neurodivergent pupils. This initiative was deeply connected to our Wellbeing curriculum, focusing on how to cultivate the characteristic of success. Through hands-on art activities, students reflected on what it means to succeed. The creative process enabled pupils to develop a strong sense of self, celebrate their unique abilities, and gain confidence in their own talents.

These projects have been invaluable in promoting critical and creative thinking, allowing pupils to reflect on their personal growth while enhancing their skills in collaboration and expression. We are excited to continue integrating the arts into our curriculum and look forward to seeing even more growth in our students' confidence and creativity.
